PART 2 - SPECIFIC REGULATIONS

Introduction

Football, along with track and field and swimming, were the first sports in which a championship was officially organised under the responsibility of CISM.

The first championship took place in Prague in 1946 under the responsibility of the Armed Forces Sports Council, which in 1948 became CISM. Great Britain won the first title and Czechoslovakia was the runner-up.

The championships continued on an annual basis until 1969. Regional and continental winners were invited to play in a final tournament for which the host country automatically qualified. Until 1967 the tournament usually involved 4 teams except for 1953 (6) and 1962 (2) in Korea. In 1968 and 1969 the tournament was composed of 6 teams but the matches were filled with many incidents that were detrimental to the image of CISM. For this reason the XXIV. General Assembly of Rome decided to cancel the 1970 tournament and to reconsider the future of the competition.

In 1972 the tournament restarted on an annual basis. In November 1973, at the suggestion of General Knulst (Netherlands), president of PTC for football, the XXVIII. General Assembly of Ambroise (France) approved the biennial format.

Since 1975 (Baghdad), the tournament has been organised every odd-numbered year. It comprised 8 teams in 1975 and 1977 and 6 in 1979 and 1981.

In 1982 and 1983, many organisational problems disturbed the running of the tournament with frequent un-sportsmanlike conduct and gestures. In April 1983, the XXXVIII. General Assembly of Zurich decided to terminate the ongoing competition and selected Kuwait and Belgium to play the final. It decided to cancel the tournament indefinitely and dissolved the PTC.

In 1985, many delegations requested the reversal of the decision to cancel the competitions and, during the XXXX. General Assembly of Seoul, Mr. Mollet, the Permanent Secretary General, proposed the resumption of the tournament under a set of regulations close to the ones presently in use today.

Except for 1987 when it included 6 teams, the tournament was normally comprised of 9 teams with two per continent plus the organising nation.

Starting in 1995, the tournament was played with 12 teams with automatic berths going to the organising nation and the defending champion.



HISTORY OF WOMEN'S FOOTBALL IN CISM

In the 1990's several countries started to develop female football teams.

The first countries having a female football team were The Netherlands and Great Britain. Here is a parallel to the beginning of football in CISM. Great Britain, no longer a member of CISM, was in 1946 the first title holder in men's football.

For several years only these two countries had bilateral exchanges between their female teams.

In May 2000 The Netherlands military football team travelled to the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ontario, Canada to compete in a series of competitions with the Canadian military soccer team and several local civilian teams. The Netherlands won this series.

From 17 to 31 May 2001, The Netherlands hosted the women's military teams of Canada and Germany along with the United Kingdom, as a non-CISM nation. Germany won this competition defeating The Netherlands in the final.

From 20 to 31 May 2002 Canada was once again the host nation with Canada, The Netherlands, the United States of America and the defending champion Germany in attendance. This tournament was organised and executed like a World Championship. The participating nations together with the President Technical Committee Football submitted a proposal to the SG to name the Canadian hosted tournament the 1st Military World Championship Women Football CISM. The first title holders were the United States of America.



1. RELATIONS WITH THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION (FIFA)

- 1.1.** The CISM football championship shall be conducted according to the rules laid down by FIFA, except for those stated more precisely by these regulations.
- 1.2.** The present regulations have been approved by FIFA.
- 1.3.** The Permanent General Secretary shall inform FIFA of the dates and location of the final round and shall also give the names of the nations that have qualified for the final round.
- 1.4.** The organising country shall invite FIFA to be represented at the final round.

2. GENERAL ORGANISATION OF THE FINAL ROUND

The championship shall be conducted over two consecutive seasons and shall consist of two rounds.

- 2.1.** A preliminary round for which the enrolled teams shall be grouped together into continental groups. They shall compete in matches to gain qualification for the final round.

The organisation and conduct of the Continental calendar shall be placed under the responsibility of the Continental Vice-Presidents. They may delegate their responsibilities and are assisted by the members of the CISM Technical Committee (TC) for Football of their continent.

- 2.2.** A final tournament comprising twelve (12) teams, i.e.:
 - the organising country,
 - the title holder,
 - two (2) teams by continent for Asia and the Americas,
 - three (3) teams by continent for Africa and Europe

The specific cases concerning continental representation are explained in 7.2.

3. ENTRIES

At least three months before the General Assembly, held during odd-numbered years, the General Secretary sends to all member nations an "invitation to participate letter" including the entry form (a commitment to participate and the final agreement) as shown at in annex 3.

This participation form must be returned to the General Secretariat before the General Assembly taking place in the odd-numbered year, so that the drawing of lots can be conducted by the Continental Vice-Presidents during this General Assembly.



4. CHOICE OF THE HOST NATION FOR THE FINAL ROUND

- 4.1.** Together with the invitation to participate in the championship (cf. point 3.), the General Secretariat (GS) sends to all member nations an intention form to organise the final round as indicated in annex 2. This document must also be returned to the GS before the beginning of the General Assembly of the odd-numbered years.

After confirmation by the GS of the receipt of the candidatures, the delegations concerned shall, within a maximum of five months, address a detailed candidature file including the following data:

- dates of the final round (cf. points 6.2. and 11.2.),
- description of the stadiums (type of playing fields surface, dimensions of the pitch, capacity of spectators, light level (amount of lux)),
- available training pitches,
- accommodation facilities for the teams and officials (barracks, hotels, etc.),
- map with the location of the stadiums and boarding centre and the distances between each place,
- sports medicine amenities,
- transportation facilities,
- security measures,
- media coverage foreseen (written press, TV, radio),

It is recommended that photographs be enclosed to illustrate the facilities offered (stadiums, lodging centre, etc.) as well as a letter of the National Football Federation supporting the organisation of the championship.

- 4.2.** After a study of the files by the Sports Commission, the CISM Board of Directors shall appoint the delegation entrusted with the organisation of the final round. This shall be done during its second meeting held in odd-numbered years.
- 4.3.** Within six months of the Board of Directors decision, the President of the TC Football, or one of his/her representatives, shall visit the selected host nation to inspect the stadiums and the infrastructure retained and to specify any improvements required.

5. ORGANISING COMMITTEE OF THE FINAL ROUND

At least six months before the beginning of the final round, the organising country sets up the Organising Committee with his/her several sections which responsibilities and attributions are stated more precisely at point 12.2.5. of the general regulations.



6. GENERAL CHAMPIONSHIP CALENDAR

The calendar of the competition depends on the number of qualifying teams.

6.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

6.1.1. If less than ten (10) teams have enrolled, the match schedule shall be as follows:

- a first phase between the 1st September¹ odd year and the 31st May of the following even year,
- a second phase between the 1st June even year and the 15th March of the following odd year.

6.1.2. If more than nine (9) teams have enrolled, the match schedule shall be as follows:

- a first phase between 1st September odd year and the 31st May of the following even year,
- a second phase between the 1st June even year and the 30th November of the same year
- a third phase between the 1st December of this same year and the 15th March of the following odd year.

6.1.3. These are the two recommended match schedules. However other systems increasing or reducing the number of phases may be considered by the Continental Vice-Presidents, responsible for the organisation of the preliminary round of their continent.

6.1.4. Teams participating in the preliminary rounds must complete Annex 3 indicating their commitment to participate in the Final Round if they qualify. Nations will not be permitted to participate in the qualifying round if they do not commit to participating in the Final Round.

6.2. FINAL ROUND

Bearing in mind the fixture list of the FIFA calendar, the final round of the championship shall take place between 1st June and 15th July of the odd years.

7. QUALIFICATION SYSTEM

7.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

Each continent is free to adopt the system, which is most convenient to it, and to adapt the calendar of point 6.1. according to the number of enrolled teams. Under no circumstances shall the date of the 15th March be exceeded.

As soon as the preliminary round is over, each Vice-president or his/her representative is to inform the Chief of Delegation of the country which organises the final round, which teams from his/her continent qualified for the final round. A copy is to be sent to the General Secretary and the President of the TC Football.

7.2. FINAL ROUND

The final tournament will take place in a country chosen by the CISM Board of Directors (cf. point 4.) and according to the system indicated under point 9. The final tournament should include the teams mentioned under point 2., however, in case a continent has less than four (4) countries (excluding the organising country) participating in the qualifying round only one will be qualified for the final tournament.

¹ 1st December for the continent with some candidate(s) for the organisation of the final round



It is then up to the CISM Board of Directors with the recommendation of the President of the TC to complete the set of twelve (12) teams.

If the organising country is also the titleholder, the President of the TC will propose to the Board of Directors which continent will be awarded the free berth.

8. DRAWING OF LOTS

8.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

Lots shall be drawn under the Continental Vice-President's responsibility to establish the schedule and match sequence.

8.2. FINAL ROUND

Lots shall be drawn during the annual General Assembly or at the CISM GS, if possible, seventy (70) days before the start of the final round. The President TC Football shall conduct it, in the presence (not obligatory) of a representative of each qualified country. The modes of conduct for drawing of lots are indicated under point 9.2.

8.3. After drawing of lots no changes may be made in the composition of the two rounds, even in the case of subsequent withdrawals.

However, if one or several teams withdraw from the final round, it shall devolve to the Board of Directors, upon a proposal by the TC Football, to complete the set of twelve participating countries in the final round.

9. GENERAL CONDUCT OF THE CHAMPIONSHIP

9.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

According to the system adopted (cf. point 6.1.) and depending on the outcome of the drawing of lots, a team may be required to play against another team (bilateral matches) or against two teams (3-team tournament) within the course of one or the other of the scheduled phases. The organisation and the conduct of other systems, such as i.e. qualification tournaments played in one country, shall be left to the discretion of each Continental Vice-President.

When the continental qualification for the final round is known, the Continental Vice-President may organise a complementary competition between the qualified countries, to award the title of continental champion.

9.1.1. BILATERAL MATCHES

These matches shall be played in the form of one home and one away match. The first match shall be played in the country that was drawn first.

9.1.2. THREE – TEAM TOURNAMENT

Each team shall receive another team and subsequently shall be received by the third. The match sequence and venues shall be determined according to the teams' ascending draw-number.



For example: three teams ALPHA, BRAVO and CHARLIE draw the following numbers:

- 1 ALPHA
- 2 BRAVO
- 3 CHARLIE

The match sequence shall be determined as follows:

- 1st match : 1 Vs 2
- 2nd match : 2 Vs 3
- 3rd match : 3 Vs 1

If a team has to withdraw from a three-team tournament, the results already obtained by this team shall be cancelled and the two remaining teams shall play home and away matches for qualification.

9.2. FINAL ROUND

The final tournament is a competition with twelve (12) teams: the organising country, the title holder and ten (10) teams qualified during the preliminary rounds on each continent.

All the matches shall take place in the organising country.

The competition shall be conducted in three phases.

9.2.1. PHASE 1 (FOUR - TEAM TOURNAMENT)

A draw is used to divide the twelve (12) teams into three (3) pools (A, B and C) of four (4) teams each. No pool should have more than two teams from the same continent. The organising country and the preceding champion are not placed in the same pool.

A draw shall be held to determine the pool and the position within the pool of each country.

The initial draw should be used to place the organising country and the defending champion.

The ensuing draw is used to determine the positions of the countries from the continent with the most representatives. Should a situation arise where two or more continents have equal number of participants, priority shall be given to the defending champion's continent.

Finally, countries from the other continents are placed, beginning with the continent with the most representatives. Should a situation arise where there is equal representation, priority shall be given to the continent of the defending champion or, if the defending champion does not originate from this continent, to the continent of the organising country.

In case neither the organising country nor the defending champion originates from one of these continents, lots will be drawn to determine the order of the continents.

If one or more teams should withdraw following the draw, the draw shall not be repeated. The following procedures specified under point 8.3. shall be used to replace the team(s).

- If a single team withdraws the replacement team will occupy the position of the team that has withdrawn.
- If several teams withdraw the replacement teams will draw lots for the positions of the withdrawing teams.

Within each pool all teams will meet in the following order:

- First Day : 1 Vs 2 and 3 Vs 4
- Second Day : 3 Vs 1 and 4 Vs 2
- Third Day : 1 Vs 4 and 2 Vs 3

All matches played on the same day shall begin at the same time.



When the eighteen (18) pool matches have been completed, the top two teams of each pool and the best two third-placed teams (a total of eight (8) teams) have qualified for the quarterfinals. Teams will be classified according to the number of points earned, in case of tie the provisions of point 12.3. will be used to determine the qualified teams.

9.2.2. PHASE 2 (1/4 FINALS)

Match 19: 1st of A Vs 3rd of B
(or 2nd of B, if only two group B teams have qualified)

Match 20: 1st of B Vs 3rd of C
(or 2nd of C, if only two group C teams have qualified)

Match 21: 1st of C Vs 3rd of A
(or 2nd of A, if only two group A teams have qualified)

Match 22: 2nd of A Vs 2nd of B
(or 2nd of B Vs 2nd of C)
(or 2nd of C Vs 2nd of A)

9.2.3. PHASE 3 (1/2 FINALS, 3rd PLACE AND FINALS)

- 1/2 finals

Match 23: winner of match 19 Vs winner of match 21

Match 24: winner of match 20 Vs winner of match 22

- 3rd place

Match 25: loser of match 23 Vs loser of match 24

- finals

Match 26: winner of match 23 Vs winner of match 24

9.2.4. NUMBER OF MATCHES

Phase 1: 18

Phase 2: 4

Phase 3: 4

Total: 26 matches



10. ESTABLISHMENT OF MATCH DATES

10.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

10.1.1. The dates of the matches shall be established by mutual agreement among the representatives of the countries directly involved.

In the case of a tournament being played in one of the involved countries, the calendar is to be established in liaison with the involved countries by the Continental Vice-President which may give delegation to the Chiefs of Liaison Offices.

In no case may the limit date (15th March of the odd years) be exceeded (cf. point 6.).

10.1.2. Once fixed the match dates may not be changed unless the chiefs of the two opposing delegations give written notice of their agreement to the Continental Vice-President with a copy to the continental member of the TC Football.

10.1.3. Any country that changes a fixed and agreed date without the agreement of its opponent, or whose team does not turn up on this date, shall entail a forfeit (implementation of point 12.5.1.). Any matches it has played shall be nullified.

10.1.4. After having agreed on the dates of their match(es), the opponents shall return their official agreement (cf. model form in annex 4) at the latest six weeks before the date of the first match.

10.1.5. It devolves upon the hosting nation to send, at the latest six (6) weeks before the date chosen, the following information:

- an application for referees (cf. point 19.1.),
- a note to the visiting team(s) with a copy to the responsible person of the continent, providing information on the general organisation of the stay and indicating the home teams colours (socks, shirts and shorts).

10.2. FINAL ROUND

If the future participants of a continent in the final round are not determined under normal circumstances by the deadline set for the preliminary round, the Board of Directors shall resolve the matter, after consultation with the Continental Vice-President or his/her representative and the President of TC Football.



11. DURATION OF STAY AND PROGRAM

11.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

Under normal circumstances the stay of visiting teams shall be limited to 72 hours. It may be longer if the form chosen by the Continental Vice-President or his/her representative foresees a tournament of several teams in the same country.

First Day : arrival
 Second Day : match
 Third Day : departure

11.2. FINAL ROUND

Visiting teams are normally limited to a stay of eighteen (18) days.

The following table, which features the three pools, will help to clarify the championship program:

11.3. Remarks

- 11.3.1. During phase 1 of the tournament the first named teams on the playing schedule will be designated the home team and will have their choice of uniform colour for that game and choice of players bench.**
- 11.3.2. During phase 2 and 3 of the tournament the Technical Committee before each match will designate the home team.**
- 11.3.3.** Within the framework of the final round an academic meeting (cf. point 29.) may be included in the program at the discretion of the host nation.
- 11.3.4.** If the host country wants to play the opening match immediately after the opening ceremony (D+1), it must invite its opponent so that their arrival is two days prior to the regular arrival of teams. If the opponent refuses, there will be no match after the opening ceremony.



12. ACQUIRING RESULTS

12.1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Attribution of match points

- three (3) points for a win,
- one (1) point for a draw,
- zero (0) points for a defeat.

The teams shall be classified according to the number of points they obtain during each phase of the competition. In the case of a tie in total points, ranking will be determined as set out under point 12.2., 12.3. and 12.4.

12.2. TWO - TEAM MATCH (preliminary round)

The team that scores the most goals in these two matches will qualify for the next round.

Should the two teams score an equal number of goals in the two matches, away goals will count double. Should the number of away goals scored be equal or the two matches end in a zero – zero tie, two fifteen (15) minute overtime periods shall be played, with the golden goal rule in effect. This means that if a team scores a goal during the overtime period (a golden goal), the match is immediately stopped and the team scoring the goal is declared the winner. If no goal is scored during the overtime, the winner is to be determined through free kicks from the penalty mark, in accordance with the procedure defined by the International Football Association Board and published by FIFA.

No overtime shall be played during the first match, whatever the result.

12.3. THREE OR FOUR – TEAM TOURNAMENT (preliminary round and phase 1 of the final round)

The championship system of play is used with each team playing one or two matches against other teams in the same group.

Positions within each group are determined by means of the following criteria, in order:

- number of points,
- difference in goals,
- number of goals scored,
- results of direct match(es),
- drawing of lots.

12.4. PHASES 2 AND 3 OF FINAL ROUND

In case there is a tie at the end of normal time, two overtime periods of fifteen (15) minutes each shall be played, with the golden goal rule in effect (cf. point 12.2.).

12.5. SPECIAL CASES

12.5.1. If a team does not report on the field within fifteen (15) minutes after the scheduled kick-off time, it loses the match by 3 – 0. The TC and Continental Vice-President may consider emergencies or extenuating circumstances.

12.5.2. If a team refuses to continue to play or leaves the field before the regular end of the match, it shall be considered as having lost. The three points shall be awarded to its opponent, with a score of 3 – 0. If, in the case of an abandoned match, the winning team had already achieved a higher score at the moment the guilty team refused to play on, or left the field, this team is declared the winner with the score standing at the time the match was abandoned. If this should happen during the final round, the guilty team shall be excluded



from the competition and its delegation shall suffer the consequences of this infringement (cf. point 27.).

13. COMPOSITION OF THE MISSION

Each country may change the composition of its team from one match to the other at its own discretion, if players are selected in accordance point 30, of these regulations.

13.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

Each country must sent to the organising country, at least ten days before the day of the match (or the beginning of the tournament) by letter, fax or email, a list with the names of the members of the mission.

13.2. FINAL ROUND

The qualified delegations must send to the organising country, at least thirty (30) days before the beginning of the final round, a list with the names of the members of the mission and a picture of each player, the coach and the assistant referee.

For each player the following additional information must be precise:

- date and place of birth,
- place on the field,
- name of the home club,
- price list, particularly the selections in the national team.

This list may be modified up to and including the first day of the final round. Thereafter no player can be replaced even in the case of injury.

13.3. NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS PER MISSION

*The match delegate must be a military person and must wear military uniform during his/her duties. His/her role and duties are set out under point 24.



14. SUBSTITUTION OF PLAYERS

The names of all players can be registered on the referee report form, except the punished players. All players are permitted during the match to sit on the bench provided on each side of the median line.

Up to a maximum of three substitutes (including the goalkeeper) per team may be used per match.

15. THE COACH BENCHES

The following persons are permitted to sit on the line bench:

Preliminary round (max. 11)

7 substitutes
head coach
assistant coach
physician
masseur/athletic trainer

Final round (max. 14)

10 substitutes
head coach
assistant coach
physician
masseur/athletic trainer

Persons punished by the Technical Jury (players and staff) are not permitted to sit on the line bench.

Once these persons are designated and noted on the referee report form no replacement is allowed.

The match delegate shall make sure that every team during the match respects the maximum authorised persons.

The organising country is responsible for delineating the technical area around the coach's benches, the only area where the coach is permitted to give instructions to the players during the match.

16. TRAVEL DISTANCES

For all competition rounds the distance between the towns where the matches take place may be no further than fifty (50) kilometre away from the place where the teams are accommodated. This distance is measured in a straight line between the two town halls.

17. STADIUMS

The nation hosting the final round is required to provide training fields for all qualified teams.



17.1. TURF

- Preliminary round matches are played on natural turf (grass), except in cases where the opposing countries agree to play on artificial turf.
- The final round matches shall be played on natural turf only.

17.2. LIGHTING

Matches are played in daylight or under floodlight. If matches are played under floodlight the organising country shall ensure that the intensity of illumination on the field is higher than, or equal to, the standards for FIFA matches.

17.3. SECURITY

To avoid incidents the stadiums chosen shall provide a full guarantee of security, such as:

- a separation (ditch, wire fencing, etc.) between the players and the public,
- the presence of police.

18. EQUIPMENT

The wearing of shin guards is obligatory. Socks must be pulled up and the jersey tucked inside the shorts.

The uniform must be marked as follows

- a number at least twenty-five (25) cm high on the back of the jersey,
- a number at least ten (10) cm high on the front of the shorts at the right hand side.

Each of the numbers must be in contrasting colour to the jersey and shorts.

Any kind of publicity is strictly forbidden on the equipment including the tracksuit. The trademark is authorised (alone or in relation with the name), but may appear only once on the jersey or on the shorts with a maximum size of 20 cm². The emblem of the National Association is also authorised on the jersey.

18.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

In the note sent to the visiting team six weeks in advance of the competition (cf. point 10.1.5.), the host country shall specify the colour of its team uniform (socks, jersey, shorts). The visiting team is required to bring a set of jerseys (numbered 1 to 18) in a contrasting colour.

In the case of a tournament with more than two teams, every visiting team must bring both an official outfit and a reserve outfit of a contrasting colour.

18.2. FINAL ROUND

Participating teams shall bring with them at least two sets of jerseys numbered 1 to 21 in contrasting colours. When engaged in the final round (cf. point 31.2.) each country must declare the colours of its uniform. The Chief of Delegation must indicate the colours (official and reserve) of his/her team uniform in annex 6.

Each player must keep the same number throughout the final round.



19. REFEREES

To reduce refereeing costs it is best that, especially for the final round, military referees with valid qualification of 'International FIFA' be appointed.

19.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

19.1.1. The respective continental bodies of FIFA shall be asked to appoint one referee and two assistant referees by the host nation via their national football federation. FIFA shall be asked to appoint officials from countries close to the host nation whenever possible who must be neutral to the nationality of the countries contending the match.

19.1.2. Refereeing costs shall be borne by the host nation.

19.1.3. The stay of the referees shall normally be limited to 72 hours. It may be longer when the Continental Vice-President or his/her representative schedules a tournament with several teams playing in the same country.

19.1.4. Whatever the retained system (tournament or home and away), each match requires the presence of one (1) referees and two (2) assistant referees. The Continental Vice-President or his/her representative makes all the decisions concerning the number of and application for referees as well as the payment conditions and expenses of these referees.

19.2. FINAL ROUND

19.2.1. Each of the participation countries shall include an assistant referee in its mission (cf. point 13.) who must be selected from the current FIFA list of International Referees. Any country not having a FIFA recognised international assistant referee shall apply for one to be appointed by its continental FIFA body.

According to the number of referees appointed by FIFA, the chairman of the TC is responsible for identifying specific requirements by informing the qualified countries whether they are required to travel with a referee or an assistant referee duly recognised by FIFA.

The expenses of these referees and assistant referees are borne by each of the qualified countries and not by the host nation.

Countries travelling without a referee or whose referee is not duly accredited shall not be authorised to compete in the final round.

The name and a photo of each referee shall be forwarded to the CISM GS not later than thirty (30) days before the beginning of the final round (cf. point 13.2. and 31.2.).

19.2.2. The chairman of the CISM Technical Committee for Football shall ask FIFA to appoint neutral referees whose nations do not participate in the final round. One of the referees is appointed as Chief Referee. If the referees' expenses are not paid by FIFA they will be borne by the host nation.

19.2.3. The roster of assistant referees and the 4th official are to be supplied by the organising country, which covers the associated costs. These referees do not require the FIFA qualification, but they must possess officiating experience at the highest national level their country has to offer.

19.2.4. The duration of stay of the referees shall be the same as that of their respective missions.



19.3. ROLE OF THE CHIEF REFEREE OF THE FINAL ROUND

Appointed by FIFA on application of the Chairman of the Technical Committee the Chief Referee provides the direction and co-ordination of refereeing during the entire final round. If necessary he may referee one or more matches, if he is a duly accredited 'FIFA-International'.

The role of the Chief Referee is as follows:

- to get the referees together before the beginning of the championship and tell them about the latest decisions of the FIFA concerning refereeing. He also transmits the instructions of the President of the TC and him/herself concerning the application of the playing rules and the organisation of the final round,
- in close collaboration with the President of the TC appoint the referees and the assistant referees for each match,
- to work in close collaboration with the organising country to provide the 4th official,
- serve as a member of the Fair-Play-Commission (cf. point 26). The day after each match he hands over to the President of the Technical Jury the referee form, his/her fair-play notes and possibly, in case of incidents, his/her report and that of the assistant referees,
- prepare a final tournament report to FIFA with copy to the GS of CISM and a copy to his/her continental federation and to his/her own national federation.

20. REFEREE REPORT FORM

The FIFA model referee report form shall be provided by the host nation. They must be completed in duplicate,

- the first copy is for CISM (for the continental Vice-President or his/her representative in the case of the preliminary round and for the President of the Technical Jury for the final round),
- the referee of the match keeps the second copy.

The referee's form, held by the referee, may be a photocopy of the one given to CISM authorities.

21. JURY OF APPEAL

21.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

Each nation has the right to lodge an appeal by fax to his/her Continental Vice-President within a period of eight (8) days following the decision taken. This fax has to be confirmed by a registered letter addressed to the Continental Vice-President, with a copy to the GS and the President of TC Football. Each appeal has to include a fee of \$100 US paid by the appealing nation. The fee shall be refunded if the appeal is upheld.

The Continental Vice-President chairs the Jury of Appeal. The Continental Vice-President appoints the three members. They are Chiefs of Liaison Offices and / or Chiefs of



Delegation who must be neutral towards the countries involved in the appeal and must not have the same nationality as the Continental Vice-President.

The Continental Vice-President decides the date and the place of the meeting of the Jury of Appeal such as during a meeting of the Liaison Offices, a Continental Meeting or a General Assembly, etc.

The Jury of Appeal may summon the following authorities to attend a hearing in an advisory capacity: the continental member of the TC, a representative from the nations involved in the appeal, the referee, the match delegate if applicable, and the TC Chairman.

The Jury of Appeal's decisions shall be valid if a minimum of half of the members, including the Chairman, is present. The voting shall be done by secret ballot at all times.

21.2. FINAL ROUND

In the special case where the Official Representative of CISM has the same nationality as one of the participating countries a CISM delegate of this country will not be member of the Jury of Appeal.

22. TECHNICAL JURY

22.1. Due to the special system used for the final tournament which comprises twelve (12) teams, the Technical Jury shall be made out of:

- a chairman who is usually the President of the TC. If the President of the TC is absent the Technical Jury is chaired by one of the present members of the TC appointed by the TC President.
- Twelve (12) members (one per participating country).

All have to be members of the Armed Forces.

22.2. All protests must be lodged in writing and forwarded to the President of the Technical Jury not later than 09 A.M. the day after the match.

22.3. Technical Jury meetings may be attended by the Official CISM Representative, in an advisory capacity only, members of the TC, referees and any other persons invited by the President of the Technical Jury.

22.4. The Jury Chairman appoints a member of the Technical Jury for each match, who has no vested interest in the competing national teams, to serve as the match delegate. This match delegate officiates at the match in military uniform. His/her duties are set out under point 24.

22.5. The Technical Jury shall convene as a disciplinary commission (cf. point 27.5.) to decide on sanctions to be imposed on players and teams on the basis of the information provided by referees and match delegates in their reports.

22.6. The Technical Jury meets every day after the matches and issues a technical communiqué with the following points:

- match results,
- the classification,
- the announcement of the following matches with jersey colours of the teams,
- the names of the referees, assistant referees, fourth official and the match delegates,
- the results of any anti-doping controls,
- sanctions,
- answers to complaints. and
- any other information decided upon by the President TC



23. MATCH DELEGATE FOR THE PRELIMINARY ROUND

23.1. APPOINTMENT

Upon request by one or more delegations the Continental Vice-President shall appoint a match delegate. This delegate may be the continental member serving on the TC Football or be selected among the CISM delegates of a country close to the competition venue.

23.2. DUTIES

To represent the CISM Continental Vice-President, vis-à-vis the authorities of the host nation.

Prior to the match

To take the necessary steps to ensure the smooth conduct of the game, with special regard to:

- the players accommodation and meals,
- the inspection tour of the sports infrastructure, lighting, dressing-rooms, playing field, etc.,
- protocol,
- contact with the referees.

During the match

- to ensure that the CISM traditional ceremonial protocol is respected,
- to deal with the match incidents within the scope of his/her jurisdiction and CISM regulations.

After the match

- to get a report form from the organising delegation before his/her departure with the number of spectators and any other relevant data (i.e. VIP, doping-control),
- to fax as soon as possible the result of the match to the Continental Vice-President,
- to forward a report to the Continental Vice-President not later than ten (10) days after the match.

23.3. Expenses

The match delegates expenses (travel expenses) are borne by the delegation(s) demanding him/her.

24. MATCH DELEGATES ROLE (FINAL ROUND)

The main role of the match delegate is to ensure that the teams' decorum and behaviour are appropriate. Upon request of the referee he mediates between team officials and players when tempers fray on the field in an effort to avoid incidents before they degenerate.

During the match he/she sits on the sidelines between the team benches of the two teams together with the 4th official. The organising committee must arrange seating to accommodate the match delegate. His/her specific responsibilities are:



24.1. BEFORE THE MATCH

- Arrive at the stadium 1 hour and 30 minutes before the start of the match.
- To inspect the colours of the teams' jerseys. If both teams are wearing the same colours then the visiting team must change jerseys (cf point 11.3.1).
- To check in the dressing room, while the referee visits the teams, to verify the numbers of the players and the players' credentials. These credentials are compared to the official list approved by the official CISM Representative, the referee report form and the official identity cards including the players' pictures, which must be produced by each player.
- To verify that the 4th official is available.
- To remind the referees of the CISM Championship Regulations concerning the taking of penalty-kicks from the penalty-spot for the matches of phase 1 and 2 (cf. point 12.3.).
- To get the anti-doping control sealed envelope from the President TC.
- To prepare the slips and the envelopes needed for the drawing of lots for the anti-doping control (cf. 28.2.) and have the printed forms for the anti-doping control available (cf. annex 10).
- To remind both teams of the maximum number of players and officials permitted on the team bench (cf. point 15.).
- To inform teams and referees of the team presentation protocol before and after the match.
- To contact the different authorities organising the match such as chief of security, physician in charge of the anti-doping control, the TC representative, etc.

24.2. DURING THE MATCH

- To have available a copy of the official list of players approved by the official CISM Representative. This list must be compared to the referees' game sheet and players not to note any players not entered on the official game sheet.
- To keep track of important events during the match and to take any necessary steps to ensure that the match is conducted under the most favourable conditions.
- To verify that the number of persons permitted on the team benches conforms to the regulations (cf. point 15.) especially after the first-half break.
- To conduct the drawing of lots at half time for the anti-doping control (cf. point 28.).
- To hold the identity cards of all players and verify the identity of players being substituted during the match by comparing player identity cards with the player being substituted.
- To verify if there is anti-doping control in effect for the match by opening the anti-doping control envelope. If an anti-doping control is in effect, the match delegate informs the teams of the players whose names have been drawn by lots. He/she fills out the printed form (cf. point 28.) (one for each team), and hands them over to the official of the anti-doping commission of the organiser.

24.3. AFTER THE MATCH

- Inform the physician in charge of the anti-doping control that anti-doping control is in effect.
- To present to the President of the Technical Jury at the next meeting of the Technical Jury:
 - o His/her report (cf. model in annex 8) on possible incidents, the quality of the refereeing, the sanctioned players, the behaviour of the teams etc.
 - o The 'Fair Play' form.



25. AWARDS

25.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

At the initiative of the Continental Vice-President a challenge cup and medals may be awarded to the champion continental team.

25.2. FINAL ROUND

25.2.1. CHALLENGE CUP

The first football challenge cup was donated by the Brazilian Delegation. This marvellous trophy was unfortunately damaged during its last transportation from Iraq to Qatar. The delegation of Qatar replaced it with a new one that was awarded to the championship team until 2001. After the 39th Championships in 2001, the delegation of Egypt donated a new cup, which will be at competed for at subsequent championships.

The President of the Technical Committee donated the challenge cup for the women's championships in 2002.

25.2.2. CUPS

At the end of the final round a cup shall be awarded to the first three teams. The three cups shall be provided by the delegation hosting the final round. Other awards may also be offered by the host nation.

25.2.3. MEDALS

The official CISM medals shall be awarded to the players and the coaches of the first three teams. Other awards may also be given by the host nation.

25.2.4. BADGES AND DIPLOMAS

See point 18.4. of the General Regulations.

25.2.5. FAIR PLAY CUP

At the closing of the final round a 'Fair-Play-Cup' shall be awarded to the team which has shown the most sportive spirit during the whole competition.

The cup is provided by the delegation organising the final round.

26. Fair Play

In order to help prevent violence and to encourage the quality of the relations between the participants, a Fair-Play Cup (cf. point 25.2.5.) shall be awarded to the team with the best sportive spirit. The team winning the championship "Fair Play" award may apply to have their team compete for the annual "Fair-Play-Trophy of CISM".

The competition "Fair Play" trophy is decided by a jury composed of

- the Official CISM Representative,
- the Chairman of the Organising Committee,
- the Chairman of the TC Football,
- the Chief Referee,
- the Chief of the Technical Jury.



The referee and the match delegate, according to a scale given in annex 6 grades each team, on twenty (20) points for each match played. The Fair Play Trophy reports (cf. model in annex 7) are forwarded to the Chairman of the Technical Jury prior to or during the meeting of the Technical Jury the morning after the match. The Chairman of the Technical Jury calculates the score of each team after each match.

The Chairman of the Technical Jury determines the average score of each team at the completion of the championship and gives it to the CISM Official Representative.

At D + 16 (cf. point 11.2.) the CISM Representative convenes the 'Fair-Play Jury' and communicates the grade obtained by each team.

Every member offers his/her advice. The President of the Organising Committee, or his/her representative, informs the other members of the jury of the behaviour of the different teams outside the playing grounds.

The Fair-Play Jury decides by voting, the awarding of the Fair-Play Cup. If the President of the TC is also the President of the Technical Jury then the CISM Representatives' vote shall be decisive in case of a tie.

27. DISCIPLINE – SPORT SANCTIONS

Serious events such as interfering with the honour and the image of CISM or scandals and/or brawls, not specifically under the jurisdiction of the different juries and commissions of the championship, are forwarded to the Secretary General by the Official Representative, Chief of Delegation of the organising country or President of the TC. The Secretary General forwards the information and documents, for study and sanctions, to the President(s) of the concerned CISM Commission(s): the Regulations Commission, the Discipline Commission, the Sports Commission or the Sports Medicine Commission.

27.1. EXPULSION (SENDING OFF / RED CARD)

27.1.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

A player sent off and shown the red card during a match is automatically suspended for the following match of the continental round in progress.

When the sending off occurs during the last match of the preliminary round the player shall automatically be suspended for the first match of the final round, if his/her team has qualified.

27.1.2. FINAL ROUND

In the case of a players sent off during a match in the final round the referee of the match and the match delegate shall submit a report to the Chairman of the Technical Jury at the latest the following morning.

Technical Jury decides on the sanctions to be applied after considering these reports and, if necessary after hearing the player and referee (or the assistant referee). If voting is necessary the vote of the Chairman of the Technical Jury shall be decisive in case of a tie.

In any case the guilty player is suspended for at least one match.



27.2. WARNING (CAUTION / YELLOW CARD)

27.2.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

If a player has been issued no more than one yellow card or two yellow cards in two different matches of the preliminary round, organised by his/her continent, these cards will be nullified for the final round.

27.2.2. FINAL ROUND

Isolated yellow cards will be nullified after phase one. In other words, players who receive no more than one yellow card over the first three matches begins the second phase with a clean disciplinary record.

Any suspensions handed out after a player has received two yellow cards during two different matches or has been ejected from a game will be carried over to subsequent matches.

27.3. SCALE OF SANCTIONS

The sanctions applied to the players for infringements or incidents occurring during the matches are the same as that of FIFA, published in the latest issue of the Disciplinary Procedures of FIFA.

27.4. SANCTIONS BY FIFA

For any sanction relating to more than three matches, the TC Chairman shall request that FIFA impose similar sanctions against the guilty player(s).

27.5. DISCIPLINARY COMMISSION

During the final round the Technical Jury (cf. point 22.5.) shall act as a Disciplinary Commission only for the technical aspects, regardless of the behaviour of the missions outside the field of play. Its decision will be based, among other things, on the written reports of the referee and the match delegate.

The decision of the Disciplinary Commission shall be final for suspensions up to three matches.

27.6. NOTIFICATION OF SANCTIONS

It devolves to the Chairman of the Technical Jury during the final round, and on the persons responsible for the respective continents during the preliminary round to notify to the participating countries any sanctions taken against players or teams.

28. ANTI-DOPING CONTROL

28.1 Doping is defined as

- the presence of prohibited substances or its metabolites or markers in an athletes bodily specimen
- the use or the attempted use of a prohibited substance or a prohibited method
- the refusing, or failing without compelling justification to submit to sample collection after notification

28.2 Doping, according to this definition, is strictly forbidden in CISM, and especially in Football.



- 28.3** At least at each CISM Military World Football Championship, if possible also at other major events, anti- doping controls will be carried out according to the latest CISM Anti Doping Regulation (Chapter IV, CISM Policy Manual) which is fully in line with the Anti- Doping Code of WADA.
Specificities of the FIFA Anti Doping Regulation will be considered when necessary.
- 28.4** The operative responsibilities of the anti- doping controls will lie with the Anti Doping Commission formed for the considered event.
The composition and tasks of this commission are defined in the CISM Anti Doping Regulation
- 28.5** At World Military Football Championships, at least eight (8) for men and four (4) tests for women will be carried out without considering world records.
- 28.6** The list of prohibited substances and methods used for the anti- doping testing in CISM events will always be the actual WADA list.

29. ACADEMIC MEETING

During the final round, in co-ordination with the TC-President, the organising delegation may propose a study day (which may be split into several sections) to deal with specific topics associated with football, such as i.e.:

- medico-physical aspects,
- training,
- traumatology,
- technical and tactical evolution,
- dietetics.

When choosing topics, the competency of the host nations' experts and physicians must be taken into account. Furthermore it is advisable that lectures are backed up with audio-visual material.

The exposés of different speakers are recorded on tape, a transcript of which is later forwarded to the CISM GS. This document could then serve as the basis of an article in the CISM 'Sport International' review.



30. CONTROL OF THE QUALIFICATION OF THE PLAYERS

Every country has to form his/her team with players selected in accordance with Chapter 3 (Sport) article 3.19. of the CISM Regulations.

30.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

The Chiefs of Mission must exchange a document, which states the military position of each player on the team roster. He must be a member of the Armed Forces of his/her country and on active duty. Any attempts of trickery on this matter shall be sanctioned and the involved team disqualified.

30.2. FINAL ROUND

The Official CISM Representative, assisted by the members of the TC shall control the identity of all of the players on either the first day or the second day of the championship.

The Chiefs of Mission shall make an appointment with the CISM Representative in order to introduce the players. Before this introduction the Chiefs of mission shall mention the names of the players on a form (annex 5). Each player must be present at this control with his/her passport and a document, which proves his/her military service.

The lists with the players of each team, certified by the Official CISM Representative, shall be given to the chairman of the Technical Jury who shall hand them to all missions. The match delegate will use these team lists to control the identity of the players before each match.

31. ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS

31.1. PRELIMINARY ROUND

In addition to the measures mentioned under point 10. concerning the establishment of the dates of the matches, the following measures shall be applied:

- host nations shall pass on the following information to the person responsible for the continent concerned:
 - o the match result by fax the day after the match,
 - o a brief report on the match with a copy of the referee's report – not later than ten days after the match.
- After having received these documents the person responsible for the continent shall immediately relay the match result and the names of any players sanctioned to all the teams of his/her continent. He will forward a copy to the TC-President, to the CISM GS and to the Continental Vice-President, and to whomever he/she has delegated his/her organisation responsibilities.
- It is the responsibility of the host team and the match commissioner, if there is one, to show and explain the present football competition regulations to the referee. They must also the referee with the information required on how to forward his/her report (if one is necessary) on the conduct of the match.



- At the end of the Preliminary Round the person responsible for the continent shall provide the TC-President the following information:
 - o the names of the teams which have qualified for the final round,
 - o the original of all the referee report forms,
 - o the names of all the players on the qualified teams who have been cautioned and sent off during the preliminary round with sanctions already applied.

31.2. FINAL ROUND

The Board of Directors shall try to appoint as the Official CISM Representative one of his/her members whose country is not participating in the final round.

As soon as the qualified countries for the final round are known and at least ten days after the drawing of lots the organising country must forward to all countries involved in the final round the invitation for the final round. This invitation shall include the format of the championship and the time limits. The invitation file does not include a principle agreement.

At the latest thirty (30) days before the beginning of the final round the qualified countries must send back the answer file received from the organising country. In this document the nation must provide information concerning the composition of the team and the colour of the outfits. A photo of the team and identity photos of each player, the coach and the referee must be attached to the answer file.

At their arrival at the championship all Chiefs of Mission shall give a cassette with their national anthem to the Organising Committee. The duration of this anthem shall not exceed 120 seconds.

32. FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

- 32.1.** For the preliminary round the travelling expenses of the referees and the refereeing costs are normally borne by the host nation. In case the competition requires the presence of more than three referees (one referee and two assistant referees) the Continental Vice-President or his/her representative will determine who will pay the expenses (cf. point 19.1.4.). If a match delegate is requested, the costs of the match delegate, including the travel expenses, are borne by the delegation requesting him/her (cf. point 23.3.).
- 32.2.** For the final round the refereeing costs are borne by each participating country which will pay the allowance of the referee of his/her own mission (cf. point 19.2.1.). The host nation bears the travelling expenses and the refereeing costs of the referees appointed by FIFA, except that for which FIFA assumes responsibility (cf. point 19.2.2.).
- 32.3.** The result of the matches can only be ratified after settlement of the travelling expenses for the referees, the match delegate and the refereeing costs. Nations that do not meet the obligations of travelling expenses for referees, match delegates and refereeing costs shall be referred to the Secretary General and the Discipline Commission.



33. LODGING

Referees must be lodged separately from the teams.

During the final round the referees, the TC-President, the TC-Presidents secretary and the members of TC may be accommodated in the same place as the Official CISM Representative and the Chiefs of Mission.

34. RESPECT OF THE REGULATIONS

- 34.1.** During a championship the current regulations may not be modified without the agreement of the Board of Directors.
- 34.2.** During the final round, after consultation with the Technical Jury, the Organising Committee and the participating nations may present to the Technical Committee for Football a proposal for changes or amendments to the regulations.

35. DISPUTES AND UNFORESEEN EVENTS

The CISM Board of Directors, whose decisions are final, judges all disputes for all matters not provided for under the present regulations, including cases of 'force majeure'.

In case of dispute or differences in interpretation, the English version of the present regulations will be authoritative.

2. Any mission unable to wear military dress for the opening ceremony of the championship will be excluded from the ceremony. An official CISM representative will give notice of this decision.
3. According to the statues and traditions of CISM, any action of a political or a religious nature during a CISM event is strictly forbidden and, in particular, any distribution of propaganda, photos, brochures, magazines, etc. Failure to comply will be severely sanctioned and will result in the exclusion of the mission involved.
4. The Chiefs of Delegation are reminded that athletes and other members of the teams must conform to the CISM Regulations of Procedure. Disruptive behaviour or lack of sportsmanship will be subject to an evaluation by the authorities for the organisation of the championship and may lead to the disqualification of the athletes or the teams involved.

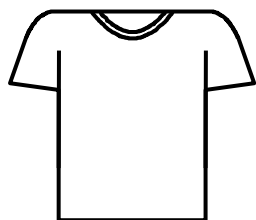

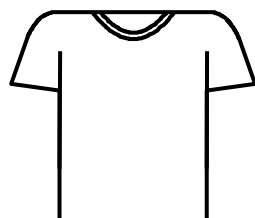

CISM SOCCER FAIR PLAY REGULATIONS

1. Table:

After each match the referee and the match delegate may give, without consulting each other, a total of 20 points for each team. This total is passed to the President of the Technical Jury (cf. point 26.3.) by means of a printed form (cf. paragraph 2 below).

The cautions and expulsions of the players result in penalty points being awarded to the team as follows:

- Yellow card = 2 points
- Red card = 5 points

The general behaviour of each team is appraised with 1 – 3 points subtracted by the referee and the match delegate for each of the following areas:

- Too aggressive;
- Gestures or uncalled for abuses;
- Attitude of the team bench; or
- Uniform not worn correctly.

The total points assessed are subtracted from 20 to give the total for each team.

If the total of the penalty points is equal to or greater than 20, the Fair Play total is zero.

<p style="text-align: center;">DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MATCH DELEGATE</p>

The main role of the match delegate is to ensure that the teams' decorum and behaviour are appropriate. Upon request of the referee he mediates between team officials and players when tempers fray on the field in an effort to avoid incidents before they degenerate.

During the match he/she sits on the sidelines between the team benches of the two teams together with the 4th official. The organising committee must arrange seating to accommodate the match delegate.

His/her specific responsibilities are:

24.1. BEFORE THE MATCH

- Arrive at the stadium 1 hour and 30 minutes before the start of the match.
- To inspect the colours of the teams' jerseys. If both teams are wearing the same colours the designated "home team" shall change jerseys (cf. point 11.3.1 & 11.3.2).
- To check in the dressing room, while the referee visits the teams the numbers of the players and the players' credentials by comparing the official list approved by the official CISM Representative, the referee report form and the official identity cards including the players' pictures which must be produced.
- To verify that the 4th official is available.
- To remind the referees of the CISM Championship Regulations concerning the taking of penalty-kicks from the penalty-spot for the matches of phase 1 and 2 (cf. point 12.3.).
- To get the anti-doping control sealed envelope from the President TC.
- To prepare the slips and the envelopes needed for the drawing of lots for the anti-doping control (cf. 28.2.) and have the printed forms for the anti-doping control available (cf. annex 10).
- To remind both teams of the maximum number of players and officials permitted on the team bench (cf. point 15.).
- To inform teams and referees of the team presentation protocol before and after the match.
- To contact the different authorities organising the match such as chief of security, physician in charge of the anti-doping control, the TC representative, etc.

24.3. DURING THE MATCH

- To have available a copy of the official list of players approved by the official CISM Representative. This list must be compared to the referees' game sheet and to note any players not entered on the official game sheet.
- To keep track of important events during the match and to take any necessary steps to ensure that the match is conducted under the most favourable conditions.
- To verify that the number of persons permitted on the team benches conforms to the regulations (cf. point 15.) especially after the first-half break.
- To conduct the drawing of lots at half time for the anti-doping control (cf. point 28.).
- To hold the identity cards of all players and verify the identity of players being substituted during the match by comparing player identity cards with the player being substituted.



- To verify if there is anti-doping control in effect for the match by opening the anti-doping control envelope. If anti-doping control is in effect, the match delegate informs the teams of the players whose names have been drawn by lots. He/she fills out the printed form (cf. point 28.) (one for each team), and hands them over to the official of the anti-doping commission of the organiser.

24.3. AFTER THE MATCH

- Inform the physician in charge of the anti-doping control if there is anti-doping control in effect.
- To present to the President of the Technical Jury at the next meeting of the Technical Jury:
 - o His/her report (cf. model in annex 8) on possible incidents, the quality of the refereeing, the sanctioned players, the behaviour of the teams etc.
 - o The 'Fair Play' form.
